A Day in Dad's Life Gold Star family member spends day with MWD trainers

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – A Gold Star Family Member spent the day with military working dog trainers here at the 341st Training Squadron on Dec. 21. After losing his father at 7 years old, it was always his dream to experience the work his father did to serve the nation.

Airman 1st Class Zachary Rodriguez, who joined the Air Force in November 2021, is an F-35 Mechanical Apprentice Crew Chief for the 61st Aircraft Maintenance Unit at Luke Air Force Base, Arizona. His father, Army Sgt. 1st Class Gregory Rodriguez, was a Special Operations dog handler, and was killed in Ana Kalay, Afghanistan, on Sept. 2, 2008, while serving in Operation Enduring Freedom. He was assigned to the K-9 unit of the 527th Military Police Company, 709th Military Police Battalion, 18th Military Police Brigade, in Ansbach, Germany.

Personnel from the 341 TRS and the 701st Military Police Battalion, an Army detachment here, started the morning with Zachary by doing a "Hero Workout of the Day" to honor his father. A lot of times I'm overwhelmed with emotion, so it's hard to say a lot of words," said Laura Rodriguez, Zachary's mother, at the end of the workout. "I'm good at lecturing my kids, I'm good at lecturing my patients, but as a Gold Star Spouse, I don't always have the words to say. All of this is really meaningful to our family." Zachary said he knew he wanted to join the military at 5 years old because of his father. "Seeing him do his job was so cool," he said. "I've always wanted to be like my dad, and at the same time, be my own self. In fact, I drive the Jeep he bought in Germany. I got it for my 18th birthday." Zachary spent the rest of the day with 341 TRS personnel doing military working dog training, such as patrol, detection, and obedience work. He experienced being the "bait" for an MWD by doing bite work; conducted a building search; and trained a dog to scout in an open field, which are all part of patrol work.

"I had a great time. I barely slept at all last night," he said. "I was so excited for this, but at the same time nervous. I do like to see and follow my dad's footsteps and see what he did... I think this was a really cool experience."

The visit ended with a ceremony at The Military Working Dog Teams National Monument here, attended by 341 TRS personnel, 701st Military Police Battalion personnel, Zachary's mother and two sisters, Malorie and Charlie. Zachary and his family are Gold Star Family Members. Gold Star family members are those who lost a loved one in military service supporting combat operations or from terrorist activities. The 341st TRS falls under the 37th Training Group and is responsible for training and developing K9 professionals and MWDs to enhance the Department of Defense's global warfighting capability.



JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – Cyber Defense professionals from nine countries across Latin America and the United States gathered in Bogotá, Colombia, Nov. 24-25, for Cyber Wings 2022. Col. Lauren Courchaine, 37th Training Wing commander, was invited as a guest speaker as a graduated Cyber commander and head of the largest Training Wing in the Air Force.

The conference, which focused on cyber defense and cyber security, was hosted by Universidad Javeriana and Universidad de Los Andes.

Courchaine, who is the first Cyber officer to command the 37 TRW, spoke on Countering Cyber Threats through Cooperation highlighting that "empowering cyber leaders through education, partnerships, and innovative research is absolutely necessary to maintain a workforce that can think critically and holistically about cyber, military operations and national security."

Her remarks were translated for the Spanish speaking audience of more than 100 cyber professionals from across all military branches from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Mexico, Panama, and the United States.

433RD TRAINING SQUADRON: END OF AN ERA

IAAFA infuses agility into training with modern technology, simulators

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – Virtual reality goggles and body worn sensors are helping to take technical training to the next level at the Inter-American Air Forces Academy here. The gear is part of a virtual reality simulator, and among the newest equipment being used to train international military students from partner nations.

The SV-R simulator will be used to train military and law enforcement students from Latin America, focusing on counter narcotic efforts and combatting transnational criminal organizations. "It's going to enhance training greatly for our students," said Master Sgt. Ricardo Alonso, IAAFA's Chief of Standardization and Evaluation, who helped bring the technology to the academy. "Many of them have never been exposed to this kind of training environment."

The SV-R simulator allows instructors to create an infinite number of scenarios in a realistic training environment. As Alonso explained, "even change the factors within it as to how lethal we have to respond as military police or law enforcement officers." The simulator features the user as an avatar and allows users to realistically interact with one another, creating a true-to-life environment. The cutting-edge technology is being implemented into IAAFA's Special Reactions Team and Ground Defense Leadership courses curriculum, where new and more advanced students can train in a controlled environment.

Gateway Wing releases new strategic plan





Basic Military Training trainees become U.S. Citizens under new streamlined naturalization process

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas — Fourteen trainees in Basic Military Training here raised their right hands and are now the first to complete the new streamlined naturalization process making them U.S. citizens and allowing them to graduate as American Airmen.

Over the course of their 7.5 weeks of training in BMT, the trainees accomplished the necessary paperwork, took their citizenship test and their Oath of Allegiance. The first three accomplished their process as early as April 11, and the remaining trainees by April 25. All were formally recognized as U.S. citizens at the Airman's Coin and Retreat Ceremony April 26.

Airman 1st Class Natalia Laziuk, 31, from Russia, was one of the first three Airmen to take the Oath of Allegiance and become a citizen. Laziuk said she had been dreaming of becoming a citizen since she was 11 years old. "I will always be grateful for every opportunity I have here in the best country of the world," she added. These trainees' citizenship ceremonies were much like any other – with only one difference: the person administering the oath was on a computer monitor, miles away.

The online process is part of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services' Naturalization at Basic Training Initiative that allows trainees the opportunity to become citizens before they graduate. It's just one of several initiatives the Air Force is taking to remove barriers to service amid the current challenging recruiting environment. "Their desire to become citizens exemplifies their commitment and dedication to the United States," said Col. John P. O'Dell, 37th Training Wing vice commander. "When we began the partnership with USCIS, we asked all trainees who would be interested in starting their application, and 111 raised their hands. These trainees volunteered to serve a country they aren't yet citizens of and now we get to formally recognize them upon their graduation as American Airmen."

The 37th Training Wing partnered with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services in March to reimplement the program after policy changes in 2017 changed processing timelines that affected a trainee's ability to naturalize prior to graduation.

Veterans recall decades of service

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – Eddie Molett grew up in the Texas country, raising chickens and hogs as a young boy. It was the life his parents had imagined for their family, but Molett yearned for more. In 1960, just weeks before he turned 21, Molett enlisted in the U.S. Air Force.

"What I wanted to do was see the world," Molett said. "I couldn't wait to get away and join the Air Force."

Molett served for 28 years and 16 assignments. His career took him to across the United States and overseas, where he developed a deep affection for Germany and the hospitality he encountered there.

"The people were so nice, they'd invite you to their home and you'd have to eat, and eat and eat," he said.

Molett was a dedicated service member. During his first few days in Vietnam, as rockets and mortars lit up the sky, Molett decided he would defend his country, even if it meant losing his life. He saw comrades injured, and others who never made it home.

"That was a hard year," Molett stressed. Despite the hardships, Molett found a sense of home in the Air Force. He retired in 1989, as a senior master sergeant, but soon returned as a civilian. Altogether, he's served 63 years in civil service. While much has changed since he retired – a lot has remained the same. "I still love it; I still wish I could wear my uniform," Molett said.

Today, Molett works as a supply technician at Camp Bullis in San Antonio, overseeing more than \$2 million dollars worth of equipment.

"Ask an MTI" informs recruiters, helps bridge the gap for recruits heading to BMT

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas –For recruits heading to Basic Military Training here, connecting with a Military Training Instructor online prior to their departure is proving to help ease the transition from civilian to Airman.

"Ask an MTI" is a BMT-led program managed by Tech. Sgt. Sarah Bento, MTI and the 737th Training Group Chief of Protocol, that connects recruits, recruiters, and instructors online to open lines of communication to better prepare the Air and Space Force's next generation of trainees and Guardians for the rigors of training.

"The program gives recruits and recruiters real-time information about BMT and the many changes," said Staff Sgt. Ruth Elliott, who has been an MTI for 2.5 years.

Elliott is one of several MTIs who are volunteering their time to engage with recruits and recruiters online in a relaxed forum that encourages open discussion.

The program began as a grass-roots effort in 2021, but Bento said that over the past several months, the program has increased significantly in terms of participants and all 25 recruiting squadrons across the country are now participating in a formalized program.


