I have been lucky to have several Air Force women make an impact on my life and career over the years. Some were commanders, while others were supervisors, peers, subordinates, or trainees. The first Air Force woman to impact my life was my Military Training Instructor, Tech. Sgt. Nikki Casey. Her professionalism and knowledge had a profound impact on me. After I graduated, I decided I wanted to become an MTI myself so that I could train, and hopefully inspire, a new generation of Airmen as Sgt. Casey did. After nine years as a maintainer, I volunteered for MTI duty and returned to BMT to fulfill my pledge.

I was lucky enough to be surrounded by other phenomenal women who pushed me to be a better leader and mentor. They are too numerous to capture in this forum, but I wanted to mention one in particular; then Tech. Sgt. Kellie "KC" Courtland and now a Colonel select. After our time together as MTIs, she returned to BMT as a flight commander and I returned as a First Sergeant. It was around this time that I was diagnosed with Primary Lateral Sclerosis. Facing the end of my active duty career and having been athletic all my life, accepting the new physical "normal" was difficult. Throughout all of this, KC continued to motivate and mentor me. She would walk with me after work and I would accompany her to several 5K, half and full marathon events she participated in. One day, I decided I was going to walk a 5K. It took me 90 minutes to complete the distance, but after I finished, I felt like I had gotten a huge piece of the "old" me back. For that, I will always be grateful to my friend and Air Force sister, KC Courtland.

Partner Nation Guest Instructor becomes first to earn AETC Master Instructor Designation

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas – For the first time in the Inter-American Air Forces Academy's 80-year history, a partner nation guest instructor has earned the master instructor badge, the highest Air Education and Training Command's instructor qualification. Intendente Jefe Alexander Pacheco of Colombia's National Police, was nearing the end of a two-year assignment at IAAFA as a partner nation guest instructor when he was awarded the designation during a ceremony here, Feb. 17.

"No one who joins the police force ever imagines the immensity of their actions, the feats they perform every day – they simply make them a part of their daily lives," Pacheco said. "I'm so proud to receive this recognition that's being bestowed to me, not only by a military force, but by the U.S. Air Force, the most important country in our hemisphere." "Having accomplished this feat is a great reward for myself and my family," he added.

According to AETC's master instruction requirements guide, to receive the title an instructor must complete a minimum of 1,000 hours as primary instructor teaching, earning an excellent or higher rating on the last three consecutive instructor evaluations and completing at least six semester hours of professional continuing education and participation in professional curriculum development projects. "It shows he's a dedicated professional in his career," said Tech. Sgt. Genaro Martinez, non-commissioned officer in charge of Standardization and Evaluations at IAAFA. "It just speaks volumes about his level of dedication because the partner nation guest instructor is only here for two years, so to be able to achieve this in that time is - nose to the ground the entire time," Martinez said.

Leaders evaluated Pacheco's records from Colombia where he served previously, as well as the work he accomplished as an instructor for the 837th Training Squadron's International Force Protection flight.

Pacheco will return to Colombia as an Instructor for the Jungle Command for the National Police.

"I can go back to my country with the satisfaction of having fulfilled my duty, but also with my head held high and the pride that comes with earning such an award," Pacheco said.

THINGS YOU **DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT IAAFA**

- 1. IAAFA teaches more than 30 courses in Spanish.
- in 1943.
- 3. Women, Peace, and Security was implemented into IAAFA's curriculum in July 2022.
- 4. IAAFA was known as Latin American School and Central and South American Air school before it became the Inter-American Air Forces Academy.
- 5. In 2007, Col. Maria Cordero became the first female to occupy the role of commandant of the Inter-American Air Forces Academy.
- 6. IAAFA's wings are highly recognized in Latin America.
- 7. IAAFA welcomed its first two female instructors in 1976, both were assigned to the Maintenance Accessory Department.
- 8. Approximately 300 students from 11 countries graduated IAAFA between 1943 and 1946.
- 9. IAAFA held several unofficial names in its early days including Aircraft and Radio Mechanic School, Panama Air Depot, as well as the Latin American Training School.
- 10. One officer and 10 enlisted members were the first to be trained in the Engineering Shop in what is now known as IAAFA.

- 11. Partner Nation Guest Instructors, are part of IAAFA's cadre.
- 2. IAAFA originated in Albrook Air Station in Panama 12. In 2022, IAAFA was commissioned to offer a mobile training team to the Pacific Air Forces.
 - 13. At 80 years old, IAAFA is older than the U.S. Air Force.
 - 14. Albrook Air Station, Panama and Homestead AFB were both home to IAAFA, at different times.
 - 15. A former two-time IAAFA graduate recently became commander of the Paraguayan Air Force.
 - 16. Approximately 53,000 students from 23 partner nations and the
 - U.S. have graduated from IAAFA, since it originated in 1943.
 - 17. The academy's cadre is made up USAF and PNGIs.
 - 18. In January 1993, IAAFA opened its doors at JBSA-Lackland, Texas, just 100 days from its relocation from Homestead, A.F.B.
 - 19. IAAFA uses simulators to enhance instruction in the classroom to include flight simulators, forklight simulators, paint simulators, a simulator in Aircraft Maintenance Officer Course and a virtual reality simulator used to teach security forces courses.
 - 20. All IAAFA students participate in the Field Studies Program, which is designed to give International Military Students a balanced view of the American way of life.

My 27-year career at the Defense Language Institute English Language Center has allowed me to move beyond the stigma of being a 15-year-old, unwed, pregnant, high school drop-out to an educated, empowered, proud government employee who has deployed to, surveyed, and visited more than 40 countries throughout the seven Combatant Commands that has exceeded every career dream I had.

The poor choices of my youth diminished my self-esteem for many years. Fortunately, that changed after completing my GED, obtaining a B.A. in Education and an M.A. in Bilingual Education, and joining DLIELC. My time at DLIELC has opened my world exponentially and allowed me to hone my skills in various academic positions, from an Instructor in General, Specialized, and Advanced English, where I taught students from over 100 countries in careers spanning across the services, a supervisor, and a Curriculum Projector Officer. During which, I had the chance to deploy to 11 countries.

In my current Overseas Program Manager position, I have surveyed English language training programs in more than 20 countries and deployed numerous Mobile Training Teams across the COCOMs. More importantly, I get to work with the USAF, DoD, and DoS in support of our joint Security Cooperation mission.

My career has provided me with the knowledge, global perspective, tools, and experience necessary to engage with the U.S.'s foreign partners using English language training to forge our alliances. Our COCOM allies utilize ELT in preparation for participation in CONUS and OCONUS training and joint exercises that strengthen their militaries and their relationships with the United States. It has been an honor to serve the Air Force through my DLIELC career.
