What does this mean?

Second Air Force is working to establish **five Technical Training CoEs** supporting groups of AFSCs under the following areas: Institutional, Information Warfare, Logistics, Command and Control and Combat Power.

As part of the command’s technical training transformation effort, courses are transitioning toward a **competency-based model**, providing more flexibility at lower levels to change individual tasks that are being trained than there is under the legacy construct.

Moving into 2025, the headquarters AETC **Command Integration Center** will provide major command-level command-and-control, situational awareness and decision information to swiftly adjust production requirements when needed to succeed in the GPC environment.



How Vehicle Maintenance Airmen keep the 'birds in the sky'

The name "U.S. Air Force" sparks images in one's mind of airplanes soaring through the sky and fighter pilots executing high-speed maneuvers as they disappear through the clouds to combat the enemy. Rarely, do people think about what's on the ground, keeping the planes in the air.

"Everything in the Air Force moves. All the vehicles that we use: fire trucks, cargo loaders, forklifts, and the vehicles that pull the aircraft, which we call tugs," said Staff Sgt. Maurice Kelly, an advanced vehicle maintenance course instructor. "I believe maintenance is what keeps things going."

Depending on what Air Force Specialty Code each Airman is assigned to, the length of their first course will vary. After Vehicle Maintenance Airmen are assigned to their duty stations, if they need supplemental training they can enroll in the four, in-house, advanced courses offered at Port Hueneme: vehicle powertrain diagnostics, chassis alignment, diesel maintenance and welding.

MOTHER OF FALLEN DEFENDER 'MARCHES ON' HONORING SON

In the sweltering summer heat, 31 Defenders trekked up the rigorous route for their graduation ruck. Sixty-five-year-old Jiffy Helton-Sarver marches near the front, carrying a guidon commemorating her fallen son, Security Forces Officer 1st Lt. Joseph Helton.

Helton-Sarver comes to JBSA-Camp Bullis three times a year to complete a 4-mile ruck on the rugged terrain in the Texas backcountry alongside Security Forces Defenders to signify their graduation from 81 days of technical training in the U.S. Air Force Security Forces Basic Officer Course. Her son was a 24-year-old security forces officer with the 6th Security Forces Squadron based at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida. After volunteering to extend his deployment in Iraq to support his detachment, on Sept. 8, 2009, he was killed by an explosively formed projectile — one of the deadliest improvised explosive devices — that struck his Humvee vehicle near Baghdad.

Quick response time saves trainee's life



On Dec. 11, 2024, a potentially life-threatening emergency was averted thanks to the swift and heroic actions of Staff Sgt. Sean Howley and Katie Samret. The pair responded to an unresponsive trainee following a physical fitness test. Without hesitation, they immediately began performing chest compressions and used an Automated External Defibrillator to administer several shocks.

Their quick response proved to be life-saving. The trainee regained consciousness and was able to leave the scene alert and in good condition. That evening, the ER doctor commended the pair for their decisive actions, noting that their prompt response was instrumental in saving the trainee's life. Thanks to their diligence and training, the trainee is expected to make a full recovery.
