Eagle Business Manager Dies Of Pneumonia

Sgt. 1st Class George H. Righter Succumbs After Influenza

Military Funeral Is Accorded by Squadron

Had Placed Camp Newspaper on Efficient Financial Footing

AFTER an illness of but a very few days, Sergt. 1st Class George H. Righter, a member of the 144th Aero Squadron and business man-ager of the Kelly Field Eagle, died at the Main Hospital, Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, of pneumonia and other complications. His body was taken to his home at Radnor, Pennsylvania, Monday evening, with a military escort.

The entire personnel of the 144th Aero Squadron and the staff of the Eagle participated in the military Eagle participated in the military funeral given the remains. Headed by the band, playing the solemn funeral march, the long cortege proceeded from the Shelley-Loring undertaking parlors to the M., K. & T. station. The coffin, draped with the flag, lay on a motor truck at the gides of which walked the pull sides of which walked the pall-bearers, all members of The Eagle staff, and, all but one, members of the 144th Squadron. They were: Thomas T. Gillen, Roy C. Elmendorf, Edmund C. Bechtold, G. H. Zink, Charles F. O'Donnell and L. A. Bryan. An honor escort of eight sergeants 1st class from the 144th Squadron followed the coffin. They were Lloyd S. Radcliffe, Charles B. Merkle, Carl E. Hatch, Frank Borger, Robert D. Little, Warren A. Brown, Clarence Adams and D. Howard George. The balance of the Squadron, under the leadership of Lieut. F. G. Russ, commanding officer, and Lieut. E. B. Hood, adjutant, ended the procession.

Service at Station. At the station the squadron was drawn up on either side of the walk leading from the station entrance to the trainsheds. The coffin was re-moved from the truck and placed on the green in front of the station. Chaplain Charles H. Stephens, read the Protestant burial ritual and of-fered prayer. The bugler from the band sounded "Taps." Then, while the band softly played "Nearer My God to Thee," the body was slowly borne down the walk, flanked with the comrades of the deceased, to the train.

Sergeant Righter was 32 years old. He enlisted at Jackson Barracks, Louisiana on December 14, 1917, and was immediately sent to Kelly Field. He was placed in quarantine and soon afterwards was made sergeant-major of the Quarantine Camp. On February 29 he was transferred to the 324th Squadron. Capt. Fred J. Enlisted Men May Now Do Solo Work Washington Rules

Opportunity Long Looked for by Non-Commissioned Men Arrives

ALL enlisted men at Kelly Field, with considerable flying experience, will be allowed to do solo work in the future, if in the opinion of their stage commander they are sufficiently qualified. This announce-ment is made pursuant to instruc-tions received rom the Director of Military Aeronautics.

Flying Department headquarters expect to be swamped with applications from men in the ranks who have never had an opportunity to fly "on their own." These flights will not be allowed to interfere with the regular course of instruc-tion and will in the majority of cases have to be worked in during spare time.

Heretofore, it has always been necessary for an officer to accompany all enlisted men on flights, no matter how wide or varied their experience in the air may have been, or regardless of the ability they

Flying Pilot Hits

Second Lieut. Robert L. Copsey, Kelly Field pilot, had a miraculous escape from death early Thursday afternoon at Alice, just below Cor-pus Christi, when his plane became entangled in a high voltage wire

and crashed to the ground.


Having escaped injury, Lieutenant Copsey, climbed out of the wrecked plane and not dreaming of any further danger, picked up the wire, which carried 8,000 volts, enough to kill ten men and was knocked down by the current. He owes his life to the fact that all but two or three feet of the wire was lying on the ground, which assimilated all but a very small frac-

tion of the juice.
At the time of the accident Lieu tenant Copsey was doing some stunt flying, along with Second Lieut. Walter Riley, which was given as the feature part of a Victory celebration program at Alice.

Influenza Epidemic Kelly Field Photo Again Appears 140 Cases Reported

Flying Department Contributes Large Number of Cases; Greater Precautions Are

Influenza and pneumonia are again prevalent at Kelly Field. The number of cases developing daily photographed. number of cases developing daily though not as large as in the former epidemic, is nevertheless sufficiently large to warrant calling the recent outbreak an epidemic. The present epidemic started but a week ago. There were 140 cases of in-fluenza and 60 cases of pneumonia in the hospitals at Kelly Field yes-

About ten cases a day are being admitted to the hospitals, which is less than during the last epidemic but the nature of the present epidemic is more severe. Lieut. Col. L. H. Bauer, camp surgeon, stated that the disease had appeared in a more virile form than previously cent. and that greater precautions against taking it must be observed.




