AN/FLR-9 Antenna, Clark Air Base, Philippines 1965

The massive circular antenna system, often referred to as the 'Elephant Cage' for its size, spanned

nearly 35 acres with forty-eight 105-foot tall antennas and a reflector screen reaching 120 feet high. The first Air Force-owned arrays became operational in Italy and England in 1965. The program expanded, adding arrays in Japan, Alaska, Turkey, and this one in the Philippines. Replaced by digital systems, the last remaining AN/FLR-9 antenna decommissioned at Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson, Alaska on 26 May 2016.

Lady Olave Baden-Powell visits Lackland



The founder of the Girl Scouts ("Girl Guides" as they are known in England) paid a visit to Lackland AFB on 14 January 1964. She toured the language school and Wilford Hall while here. Olave became the Chief Guide for Britain in 1918 and then World Chief Guide in 1930. She visited more than 111 countries making a tremendous contribution towards the development of the Girl Scouts around the world.

37th Tactical Fighter Wing



On 17 January 1991, members of the 37th TFW launched the newest aircraft in the US arsenal to start OPERATION DESERT STORM. Ten F-117A's of the 415th Squadron launched against targets in Baghdad, Al Taqaddum, Al Taji and Salmon Pak.

The actions of the squadron paved the way into Iraq for other Air Force units by systematically attacking integrated operations centers, radio relays, sector defense and other valuable targets.



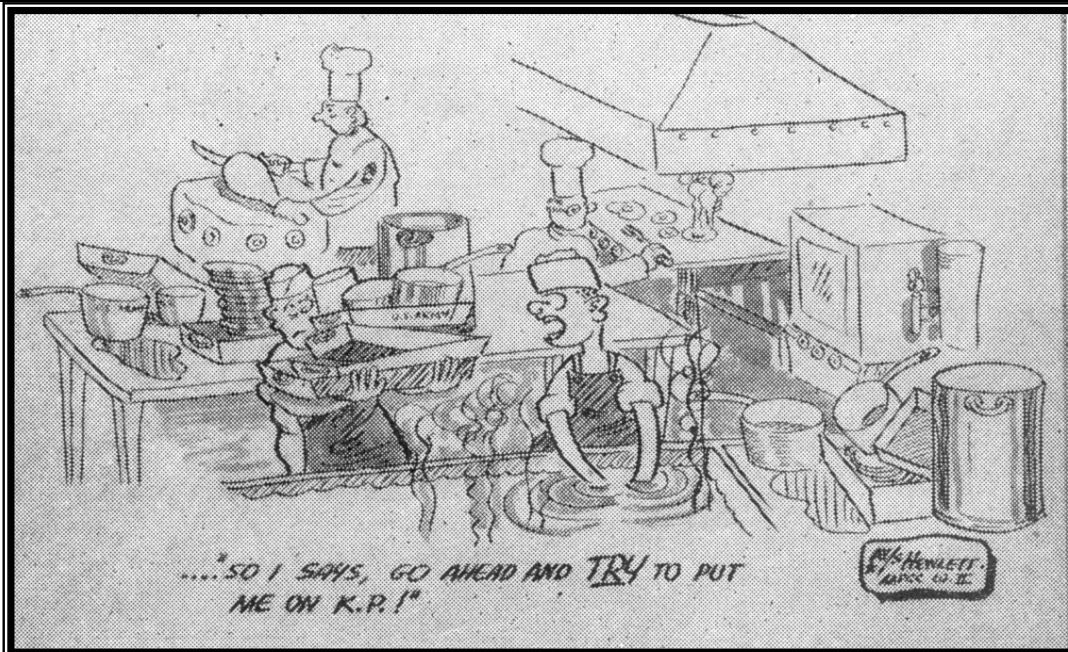

1967: Wilford Hall Support to the Apollo Mission

Wilford Hall personnel supported the Apollo 258 mission with Project M-023. Lower body negative pressure testing, performed under Project M-023, was being considered as a replacement for tiltboard testing on all of the Apollo 258 astronauts. The test was scheduled to be performed on two of the three primary crew members. The Apollo 258 mission was postponed in January 1967 because of the death of three astronauts. This method of testing orthostatic tolerance was still under consideration, although aerospace laboratory officials believed it would not be used until the second manned Apollo flight.
